



Maidstone has a strong, thriving economy which is ready to welcome visitors but is also great fun for the people who live here. It has become the Event Capital of Kent with its wide and varied programme, which runs through all the seasons and offers a great selection of venues. The River Medway, which runs through the town centre, takes you straight out to the countryside along a traffic free, green corridor.

Maidstone has a long and colourful history with famous battles, courageous people and trade being key. Fresh produce, from the Garden of England, travelled from here to London to feed a city of people. Maidstone is particularly famous for paper, print, sweets and gin production.

Mote Park is the largest park in Maidstone with a glorious lake, stunning wildlife and green corridors linking it to the Kent Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Beyond this there are many other good parks and wildlife areas worth exploring.

PILGRIMS CYCLE TRAIL

The Pilgrims Cycle Trail runs from Rochester to Canterbury passing the outskirts of Maidstone at Sandling, Bearsted, Hollingbourne, Harrietsham and Lenham. This runs through the AONB of the North Downs, and lining the route you will find interpretation boards explaining the landscape and history, spectacular views and lovely local pubs where you can relax.

RIVER MEDWAY TOW PATH

The River Medway Tow Path runs from Aylesford to East Farleigh, mainly following the watercourse. You are spoilt for choice for cafés along the route, some are immediately adjacent to the river with lovely views and provide interesting places to sit and watch the wildlife or simply enjoy the shade under the weeping willow trees. Beyond the end of this route are some lovely country lanes and places to explore, including the villages of Yalding, Laddingford and Wateringbury.

RAIL TRAILS

Explore Kent have put together a group of trails that follow the paths of railway lines in and around Maidstone. These walks will take you through the town, along the river and past many local pubs and attractions you can take in along your way. You can find the full selection of walks at

GETTING AROUND

Maidstone has an excellent public transport network with three train stations: Maidstone East and Maidstone West in the Town Centre and Maidstone Barracks just outside.

Maidstone West Station joins to the Paddock Wood line and there are a number of stations along the route allowing for exploration along the river and return by train for tired legs. From Paddock Wood you can reach Marden, Staplehurst and Headcorn all with great opportunities to explore the countryside of Kent.

National cycle route 17 extends through the town centre, linking Maidstone with the Medway Towns to the North and Ashford to the South. This route takes you right past the Kent Wildlife Trust visitor centre at Tyland Barn off the A229.

Leaving the car at home for some trips will save you money and reduce emissions. It also allows you to be active as part of your daily routine, helping you to stay fit and healthy. Take a close look at the map and see how easy it is to walk or cycle from your home to the station, school, or town centre.

THINGS TO DO

Mote Park is an award-winning park covering 450 acres complete with a huge lake. The park is now home to a Watersports Centre and other activities like a climbing wall and high ropes

Maidstone Museum has a wealth of information on local history but also collections of international importance.

Kent Life Farm Attraction has a collection of historical buildings, owlery, vintage tea room, shop, farm animals and children's play areas.


Maidstone River Park stretches 12km along the River Medway through town and parks. Discover the new nature trail with 20 posts to find, each to help you learn more about the animals living here.

The Hucking Estate is run by the Woodland Trust and can be found on the top of the North Downs near Maidstone. It has excellent trails, information about this special environment, has wood crafted sculptures and is fun to explore.

Leeds Castle with 500 acres of parkland and gardens is a little way out of town but a great day out by bicycle.
